-  New medication order
-  Temperature over 102
-  Severe abdominal pain
-  New student with health needs
-  Communication from health care provider
-  Suspected child abuse
-  Severe, unusual symptoms i.e. severe headache
-  Unidentified rash
-  Any student with oxygen brought to the clinic
-  Quick relief inhaler (for students with asthma) does not work
-  Directed to do so by the health care plan
-  Student has a seizure
-  Any diabetic care i.e. blood glucose testing, insulin dosage
-  Head injury
-  911 is called
